



An Important Message from the Glaze Committee:

There is now a list of previously approved glazes that we no longer carry. It is located with the list and properties of current glazes that is pinned to the wall by the high fire glaze sample tiles. You may purchase these on your own and use them in studio. It is best to let kiln techs know what you are using with a little note.

Starting in a week or so, we will be slowly transitioning to Mayco fundamental Underglazes. We will start with 9 and add additional as we

use up the velvets. There are 60 possible colors and we will be testing them all and choosing those that do best at cone 5.5. We think you will like the vibrant colors, and the cost of \$13.00 a pint will sure help the studio. The test tiles will be round and they will come in pints. Remember if there is an Amaco Velvet you cannot do without, you may purchase your own and use them in the studio.

New glazes recently approved are Mayco Amarayllis, Amaco Orange Satin Matte, Amaco Chartreuse Satin Matte and Mayco Sea Salt. Sea Salt is here now, the others in a week or so.

We plan to use the quiet months ahead to get "everything back in order" and enjoy ourselves in the studio. Keep your suggestions coming, we will review them but probably hold off on adding or subtracting glazes until our Snowbirds return.

We look forward to having a Glaze of the Month starting in October, and we welcome member participation. Please contact us if you would like to participate.
